He was active in the affairs of his church, and did much for its well-being.

Mr. Gehr was admitted to the Franklin County Bar at an early age and at once began the practice of the law with his father, Hon. Hastings Gehr. All his legal work was conscientiously and carefully performed and his business judgment was good. In the work of the official position he held for some years prior to his death he was much interested and was exceedingly accurate. He was scrupulously obliging and courteous toward his fellow members of the Bar. In the death of Mr. Gehr the members of this association feel a distinct loss.
